Dearest Albert,

The news were so very very encouraging this morning it makes me feel better. As it may not be so long now until we can be together again. I do hope you are well dear One and Cheerful. I try to be Cheerful I am that or pretend to be but you know how sad it is to have my man over there and can't do much for him. And so very little for other folks, maybe if I can stay here this winter I can do some of the things that I know you would want done. Mrs. Reynolds hasn't mitter yet about her teeth but she won't get any rest about it

until she contents because she
will have trouble all winter.
I want to get a Liberty Bond for
my maw for Christmas. How
would you like that? There
isn't a thing one can send
any more.

Grant Shade said you were
sixty miles from Rheims. Today's
paper mentioned the Rheims-
Soissons sector, how there
was no resistance by the Germans
after the first charge. I wondered
if you and Harry might be
there. Your letters will all be
so short now and maybe you
will have to send those trench
cards.

Mrs. Reynolds wrote this week
and said news was scarce.

she was well but very lonesome as there were so few in family. George and Clemet were both working for Elmer, and Bob had gone to Nebraska as he wasn't very well, having caught a cold during a rainy spell. After I had made up my mind to talk to him, he returned to Nebraska.

Poor old Glenn is safely overseas now and how I hope and pray you both may be safely overseas again and soon!

Are you wondering about my school work? well dear it is so far the pleasantest work in school I have had. I teach only one Freshman Class and that is algebra. The whole

school is it as large as my one
grade in Ellsworth, so you see
it is it so bad. The other classes
are small only four or five and
that is it hard. I hope I like
it all the time as well as I
do now. I haven't signed any
contract so far, as I don't know
about my Certificate.

We have the Superintendent
Mr. DeArmond, Miss Hunter and
myself in high school. I have
nothing hard to teach and like
it so far.

Kate came to see me after school.
She came up stairs and
asked for Miss Becker. Mr.
DeArmond told her there was
no one there except the
teachers. Kate started away
and then remembered it was

I am going ^{home} to-morrow night
The silver girls come down
in the afternoons and evenings
and help her with the work.

She is going to try out a high
school girl next week and

will come on over right
away. But she will come

there, but I guess mother
would rather not. I heard
of some rooms already
furnished that we may be
able to get. I would like
that better. don't you think

room too. if you were able
to write oftener you could
tell me what to do, but
since you are not, we must
do the best we can dear one.
I pray for you every day dear
and think about you and
try to imagine what you
might be doing. I hope you
get the most of my letters, you
can't expect to get all of
them perhaps.

Do you see Harry? we haven't
heard from him for so long.
Well dearest Lover be careful
of yourself and come
home soon to your wife
who loves you with all her

Sep 6 1918

from Albert since 21 of July and

I will send you a slip I cut
out of the post about the soldiers
mail maybe we will get our
mail more reglar you speak
of my teeth I would rather
wait a while I think we will
get the insurance we have
two letters in regards to it
but we never got the policy
they wanted to know what
kind of condition he was in
when he went in and during

the time he was in the camp
we roat for a blank to fill out
and they roat back they
didnt have any blank but
for us to have affidavits
maid out so we had four
maid out. Ed Porter Dr Bush
Billie Homes and the Banker
Ed Porter told them Fern
had worked for him four
years and he would say
his mind was all right
we havent sent them in
yet you speak of the dress
I would be glad to have
them if you dont need them
Mories husband will register
the 12 of sep he may get put
in second or hird class as
he is an oprator he is going
to Lyons to work so they will
be close to home I roat to
Albit and Glenn last monday
please let me know when you hear from
