Dearest Lover,

well dear I suppose you are busy now with little time to write. It is a good thing in a way, as the time doesn't seem so long. I am busy now too. Albeit and I hope the winter goes quickly. I had been teaching in Kanopolis and Mr. Silverwood offered me an extra grade, made up of the Third and Fifth. The Kanopolis people wouldn't let me off, so I couldn't take it. Perhaps after all it may be for the best, we were so cold in this house last winter and if I were gone part of the day I am afraid she would get too cold. If I can get a nice place for us both over there for the cold months, I am sure it would be better. I like the work over there and am glad they liked my work so well. It is my first attempt at high school work and it seems so much easier. The subjects are hard but that is better than teaching forty five little folks something easy. Mother is very much pleased with it. We have a girl here who does the work for her board.

I sent Ada my grey suit and some waists for her to make over for school.

I told Mrs. Reynolds I wouldn't dare have it when you came back as you wanted me to give it to the Belgians and Harry told me to throw it in the creek. There are some more things she can have if she or Gladys needs them. I want to get all new clothes when you come back and had better start to give some away. My first pay check comes in two weeks, I wish you were here to help me think what to get for someone you love. I have decided to get her a black and white dress like mothers. I don't know whether to ask her to go to Salina and buy one or send off for one or give her the goods, but think it had better be already made or she might cut it up for someone else. I wish you were here dear one, it is so lonesome always to be without you and can't hear from you so often, I depend on you so much for everything I do, and now I seem so lost with you gone.

I am not going to use a cent of the thirty dollars and that will be \$70 and surely I can find another thirty and that is for us to use when you come back. You will need a rest and I want to have you a little while before you start in something. I make great plans don't I dear?

but what else is there to do? I want her
to get her teeth too, but don't know whether
she will or not, I think she dreads it, I
know I would. There is a hole in one of
my teeth and I keep putting off fixing
it. I wish you could go with me and
hold my hand, it wouldn't hurt so bad.
It has turned cold for a few days
but will soon warm up again.
Fair week is next week, it is a poor
time to have it as no one is really
interested in such things, just
try to be. They wanted me to bring
up my China and my bed spread
but I didn't. I might have made
four or five dollars off of them and
I might have broken some too and
it isn't right to paint during war.
Do you think so? we may get off
one or two days next week for the
Fair. Do you remember when you
took me up there? And I sat on your
lap when we went there?

The papers are so very encouraging
now. Today you could look on
German Land. It is a big work
you are doing over there,
Mother and I went to the show
last night. "Lest we forget"—

it was a war picture and showed
us your life over there to a certain
extent. It must be terribly about,
I don't see how you ever can do it,
so many of the boys didn't get as
much training as you have.
I pray for you every day dear, for
God to bless and comfort you and
protect you and bring you home
unharmed. And that this war will
soon be over. I pray for Glenn and
Harry and all of our boys over there.
I am going to write to Glenn too
nearly every week if I can. It will
be hard as I don't know what to say
to him as I do you.

Bergh has his barn, cow barn, and
chicken house built and will begin
on the house soon. It is to be built
like Henry Bachofers. Do you remember
it in Salina when we staid at Henry's?
They haven't decided where the house
is to be but it really doesn't seem to
matter. The chicken house is in the
south east corner of the yard. I haven't
seen them yet.

Write just as often as you can dear
one. I love you with all my soul and
strength my own true man.
