Dearest Lover,

Your letter of Nov. 3 came to-day.
The first one since Sept. 23 and
you know how glad I was to get
it altho' your mother had a letter
written Oct 4 and Oct 25. It was
good to get a letter from my lover
even if he didn't write it himself.
From your letter I suppose you
expect your hand to get well in
time. We were so afraid you
could never play your violin
again. But you can, can't you
dear? Can't you tell me how
you were hurt, dear, and where
else besides your hand?

Mrs. Reynolds had a letter from Glenn written Oct 26. He was well then. He is in the 88th and I see by the papers they are coming home soon. Two of the boys who left here when Glenn did are to be the first from Furston to leave.

Glenn was in action but came out in good shape.

The morning's paper stated the some time in December some of the 89th would be sent home and also the wounded. The majority are to stay as the army of occupation.

Dearest I haven't the faintest idea of when you will be

sent home but I do know you aren't fighting and you are getting well and can walk around and in time your hand will be well enough to play your dear old violin again. And so, dear, my heart is lighter than it has been for years. It will only be months, now dearest, not years.

we will have to wait. And how happy we will be dear when we can spend the rest of our lives together. You will have so much to tell me, dear. And I will have so many questions to ask. And I can hold you in my arms until my heart is content, can't

o, my darling? and will you
love me too? I am so lonesome for
you Albert and so anxious for my
Lover to come home. you would
get well so much faster if you
were home with me and I were
caring for you. I am taking a
course in "Home Nursing"
every Monday night. Last week
I learned how to care for a
new born baby, how often to
feed it etc. I haven't had ~~to~~
how take care of soldiers so will
have to use what I know. But
don't worry Sweetheart, Little
babies have to be fed every two
hours. So if I don't learn another
thing - you won't starve.

Dearest, I had sent your box
before Nov. 20. So many didn't get the
labels so we could sign up for
one. But I sent your box to your
Co. H. as I didn't know where else
to send it. I will try writing in
to Co. Headquarters and giving
them your address. That is all I
can do. I didn't send a thing but
"eats". Altho' I have your Christmas
presents here and you can see
them when you get home.

Have you had any mail since
you have been in the hospital?
It would be so hard for you if
you had not. We are all well,
dear and feel so good to think
it won't be long until you can

be with us again. It was a truly Thanksgiving this year dearest. So much to be thankful for. your mother had just received your letter before that day.

So far no one has had a letter written since Nov. 11. Altho' yours was mailed that day. Did you get my letter and pictures?

Harry is getting along fine but he is in a rather bad humor, poor boy. in the hospital three weeks - thirty three in a small tent, negroes and Mexicans too. besides his bronchial trouble, some one gave them a worn out phonograph. His shoes and clothes were in

a delousing station so he couldn't get up and kick the thing out. But you know more of the conditions than we do.

A letter every week Albert would be much more than I have had or expect. I will try not to worry dear for I know you would write if possible. I write three times a week and hope you get some of them.

Our schools have opened up again and I am rather glad to be busy again. I like high school work better than grade work. The children are so nice to me and I like them so well. I feel fine dear only have trouble

in getting enough to eat, as
Mrs. Hall is such a good
cook. I am simply starved to
death three times a day and eat
so much I feel ashamed of my
self. Can't you tell me more about
yourself dear? It seems, after
all, we know so very little.

I am so thankful my beloved
is alive and getting well. I love
you with all my strength dear,
and will be so happy to get
you back again.

God bless my own dear man
and grant it may not be long
until he comes home to me.
