Mrs. Caswell called up last night telling me Hugh Miller had seen you in the hospital. It was so good to know someone had seen you. Isn't it possible for you to get home sooner than the 8<sup>9</sup><sup>th</sup>? Some of the boys are asking for a discharge and some are going to stay in war work. Dear Can't you apply for a discharge? I want you so badly to come home just as soon as you are well enough to come. So many of the boys write home they are enlisting for a year in war work.

I am so lonesome for my dear man and our life after all is so short, I want you just as much as I ever did

and more too. I hope your hands are both well by now and you can use them as well as ever in a short time.

I didn't know your left hand was hurt too until Hugh Miller told Mrs. Caswell ~~told~~ it was getting along nicely. were you hurt any where else? you have not told me but for some reason I think you were.

Everything moves along about as usual with me. I am heavier than I was and feel fine all the time.

School work goes on about the same. I enjoy it very much and feel I am getting some good out of it besides my wages. I am not saving so much after all from my wages, but I can save all of

your dear now. I had to use some of Sept. allotment, so now dear you have the big amount of ~~7~~ 66.60 - when I get the other bond paid for I want to save more, so we can have some to use when you come home.

Did I tell you dear I bought a new watch? It is quite nice looking, I think and looks good and keeps good time. Will you like it?

Your money comes every month, or has so far. It comes the last of the month. I think there is about forty dollars in Kauopolis bank and none in Ellsworth bank - except yours. We want some left for us when you come home, won't we? I haven't decided on all my

Christmas presents yet. There are  
so many things I want to get.  
your mother, I want to get her a  
table cloth and six napkins - a dress  
and a bath robe, which would  
she rather have? or shall I get  
her all three? It wouldn't be too  
much from us, would it? and  
then get a treat of apples or  
candy for the rest, would you  
like that?

I am going to get Bergh a pen  
and a bottle of ink - He has no  
ink but red, whenever I go there.  
I am going to get Kate a table cloth  
I ought to get Marie and Eva  
the same thing, don't you think  
so? and Gladys too? and Florence?  
I have a bag made for Aunt  
Fau but what shall I get for  
Uncle Abe?

I am going to get Mother a reading glass, and Harry a pair of gray silk socks. I don't know what to get Aunt Nannie? And I should send something to Florence.

I would like to get Mrs. Fair's and Mrs. Hall a pretty Christmas plant.

wouldn't it be nice to remember Uncle Jim too? But what shall it be?

I saw a book "The Jewels of Opar" by the same author as Tarzan of the Apes. I want to get it for you too. you want something besides your bond and penant don't you Lover?

do you remember the desk set I started for you ages

ago? I am looking for some  
more brass pieces to go with  
it.

It is so nice and pleasant this  
week, we have to keep the doors  
and windows open. I was so  
glad to know you were  
having nice weather as it  
is just that much more  
pleasant for my Sweetheart.

I hope you can soon write a  
nice long letter to me. It has  
been so long since I have  
had one. The last letter that  
you had written was Aug. 23.  
And it has been so long since  
then. When have you had  
any mail? I write three times  
a week dear and do so hope

you get some of them at least.  
Don't worry about us dear, we  
are all well and feeling fine.  
we don't know what you have  
suffered and endured since  
we parted at the train one day.  
we were so happy and I  
expected to see you again  
in a week or two. Dear, haven't  
you any idea when you  
are coming home? I try  
not to think about it all  
the time but I can't help it.  
I want you so dear man.  
You are mine and I love  
you so and want to be  
with you as life is so flat  
with the whole world over in  
France.

you have done enough, now  
it is time for you to come home.  
I am so anxious to see you  
again, could you have a  
picture taken dear? Harry  
sent one to us.

Dearest I am waiting for you  
dear one and try to be just as  
patient as possible but now  
that you aren't fighting I feel  
you should come home.

Write to me when ever you can  
and tell me more about  
yourself and how you were  
hurt.

God bless my own dear man  
and bring him home soon,
